The student will be expected to demonstrate proficiency in German (present and present perfect tenses) at the basic level in:

- 1. Aural comprehension of simple discourse in two tenses.
- 2. Reading comprehension of simplified texts.
- 3. Speech delivery: express feelings and reactions and narrate in the past.
- 4. Written expression: guided composition.
- 5. Understanding target cultures.

- 1. Basic syntactic structures
- 2. Basic lexicon
- 3. The phonological system of German
- 4. Some aspects of the culture of German speaking countries

O: Methods of Instruction

The functional and communicative approach will be used.

Classroom activities include: presentation of material by the instructor, practice in pairs, listening comprehension, audiovisual presentations, and conversation in small groups with a Native Language Speaker.
